COURSE DESCRIPTION

This workshop series will be a look at film making as a performative expression of writing by means of the moving image. The stance from where this journey is initiated can be manifold, introspective reasons of writing as an expression of oneself or an outward-looking approach to tell a story to an audience. It comes with the pivotal notion and understanding of writing as a format that allows you to turn complex ideas and examine independent thinking. The filmic notation as a method and medium will be thoroughly analysed.

Academic expectations

Students have to carry out the required readings, work continuously on their project, and watch the requested material. Seminars will be discussion-based - it means that we will have an interactive pedagogy. Additionally, every student is strongly encouraged to share material and ideas with fellow students on discussion forums, via email, skype or common groups. Since it is an intensive workshop, students are asked to carry out as much independent research as possible to develop their creative practice and theoretical thinking around their project.

- 1) Practical Exercise (50%): Statement of Intent (25%): one page written detailing your personal intentions and ideas for your project. You would have to present theoretical insights and practical ideas which are being implemented, based on the material from this syllabus. Sound recording (25%): collective or individual exercise of sound recording (less than 1 minute), to be presented and discussed in class.
- 2) Project (50%): the project will consist in an individual or collective short film of minimum 1 minute and maximum 5 minutes. The aim of this project is to help you find your own voice, based on your personal experience. You are free to film footage with various means (smartphone, movie camera...) and video editing is not necessary. Projects can be released either in French or English. Grades will be based on your progress and involvement in your project throughout the workshop. You are requested to present orally in one minute your finished film in front of a wide audience, at the end of the workshop. This presentation will happen on Thursday 18th, at 18.30 PM. During this short presentation, it is expected that to explain how your initial statement of intent has been modified by your own practice and what creative process you followed.
- 3) **Participation (10%):** students' engagement, participation to group exercises, answering questions, final oral presentation.
